



2007 National Leadership Workshop

LOUISVILLE, KENTUCKY

On Friday, October 19, 153 enthusiastic Alpha lambda Delta members, representing 78 chapters, 34 advisors along with members of the National Council and National Office Staff made the trip to Louisville, Kentucky for the 2007 Alpha Lambda Delta National Leadership Workshop. The home of the Kentucky Derby was the ideal setting for this year's theme, "We're Number One: A Celebration of Champions."

Friday evening began with words of welcome and an overview of the goals of the Workshop from ALD Executive Director, Dr. Glenda Earwood.

Dr. Joni Comstock, Senior Vice President for Championships of the National Collegiate Athletics Association, was the keynote speaker. Dr. Comstock described her college days and how she arrived at her current career in collegiate athletics. She stressed the need for knowing yourself and following your dreams.

A graduate of Eastern Illinois University, she received her master's and doctoral degrees from Illinois State University. Her past professional experience has included responsibility for 16 NCAA Division Sports programs; recreational sports and athletic facilities at American University; Director of Athletics at the University of North Carolina, Ashville; Senior Associate Director of Athletics at Purdue University; and Assistant Director of Athletics at the University of Illinois, Champaign. She is currently serving on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Collegiate Women's Athletics Administrators.

Following Dr. Comstock's inspiring address, participants brought their donated sports equipment for year's service project at the Louisville Presbyterian Community Center. Mr. Steve Edwards, a staff member at the Center, accepted the gifts and expressed his appreciation for what these gifts would mean to the children. The Presbyterian Community Center (PCC) was founded in 1898 under the leadership of Reverend John Little and six students from the Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. The Center for over 100 years has provided local residents with a full spectrum of social services,

childcare, senior activities, child development, educational enhancement as well as sports and recreational programming.

The evening continued with refreshments, get acquainted mixers, and the traditional t-shirt exchange, while advisors met with National President, Dr. James Stemler.

On Saturday morning, following a big breakfast, participants heard information from Lee Greenway, Director of Communication, and Dr. Mike Nichols, Editor and Historian, about getting stories and pictures in *The Flame*, the Alpha Lambda Delta national magazine. National Council members Christina Ho and Dan Burk, along with Dr. Earwood and Mr. Greenway, described the many services provided to individual Chapters by the National Office at Mercer University in Macon, Georgia.

A luncheon followed with Chapter Recognition Awards and the presentation of the 2007 Advisor of the Year Award to Dr. Danny Kelley who provided an inspiring address about the importance of Alpha Lambda Delta.

Dr. Kelley is Coordinator of Greek Life and Leadership Development at American University in Washington, D.C. He is a graduate of Wright State University, and received his master's degree from the University of Dayton and a doctorate in educational management and leadership from American University. Dr. Kelley was born in Greenville, South Carolina but because of his father's military career has lived throughout the United States, as well as England, France, and Japan. He is an avid Washington Redskins and Nationals fan, and since he spent many years living in Ohio, he loves the Cincinnati Red and Bengals and the Ohio State Buckeyes.

Following the luncheon, participants had the opportunity of touring several sites in the Derby City including the Louisville Slugger Museum, the Muhammad Ali Center, Louisville Glassworks, Louisville Science Center, FlameRun (an artisan glass studio), and the Kentucky Museum of Arts and Crafts. A popular destination for many was Churchill Downs and the Kentucky Derby Museum.

That evening, ALD members and advisors departed from the docks of Louisville to board the Spirit of Jefferson for a riverboat cruse down the Ohio with dinner and lots of dancing! A real Kentucky buffet was served, and everyone enjoyed seeing the skyline of Louisville at night.

Sunday morning featured a light breakfast, evaluations of the workshop, and good byes. The same magic seems to happen with each annual workshop. Over 150 "strangers" leave as friends with promises to stay in touch and exchanges of email addresses, each bringing new ideas and strategies to help build their chapters.

The Recognition of Champions

As part of the 2007 National Leadership Workshop, the 2007 Alpha Lambda Delta Awards Luncheon was a wonderful opportunity to celebrate the successes of Alpha Lambda Delta members and chapters. Outstanding Advisor of the Year, Dr. Danny Kelley, delivered the keynote address for the ceremony - "A Luncheon of Champions." Excerpts from his address are printed below - for more information about Dr. Kelley's Advisor of the Year Award, see page 22.

Since leadership is a core value of Alpha Lambda Delta; it makes sense to address this important topic with our workshop delegates.

Leadership is one of those things that is difficult to define, but is one of those things that you simply recognize when it is happening.

I believe there are some basic concepts one can embrace to position oneself to be a successful leader. In keeping with our workshop theme, I have chosen the word "champion". Each letter in this word can provide you with some approaches to consider and leadership behaviors to embrace in your lifelong journey of becoming a successful leader...

C

The C in champion is for "charismatic". In order to be a charismatic leader, you must first exhibit a belief in the organization you are leading. In our case, if we don't truly believe in Alpha Lambda Delta, it will be difficult to hide this from our members and motivate them to support your efforts. You must also be sensitive to the environment and to the needs of the members. Finally, you must have a clear vision for the organization and be able to effectively articulate that vision.

H:

The H in champion is for Habit. In order to be an effective leader, you must adopt good habits. This requires consistency in performing with excellence. Excellence should be a habit.

A:

The A in champion is for Attitude. Your attitude can make all the difference in how you succeed as a leader and the willingness of your members to support you. A positive attitude is contagious, as is a negative one. Your attitude should promote motivation, commitment, excitement, and positive energy.

M:

The M in champion is for Making a Difference. As leaders, we should always be asking the question, "How can I make a positive difference?" Alpha Lambda Delta chapters do this all the time with their impressive, innovative community service projects. Leadership is about making a positive difference in the lives of others.

P:

The P in champion is for Passion. Passion and purpose go hand in hand. You must have passion about Alpha Lambda Delta, but this cannot happen without understanding and then embracing the organization's purpose. Passion is not something that can be taught. Passion in pursuit of purpose must come from within.

1:

The I in champion is for Integrity. I believe that integrity is the most critical

leadership quality one can possess. Why is integrity important? Because without it, leaders lose the trust of their followers. Without trust, followers begin to question their leader's decision-making, their values, their motives, and their ethics. A leader simply cannot be successful, at least not for long, without leading with integrity.

0:

The O in champion is for Optimistic. Leaders will constantly be challenged and some outcomes will not always be aligned with what was planned.

Change is inevitable in all organizations in order to achieve positive growth. Change is one of the biggest roadblocks to maintaining optimism, especially when it is directed from an external source. Not many people enjoy change. A leader must not only be able to remain optimistic during these times, but must be able to create a sense of optimism in his followers during those transitional times.

N:

The N in champion is for Never – never, never give up. We must always remember that leadership is a life-long learning process. There will be bumps in the road, but you must endure. Failure is inevitable from time-to-time, but you must endure. Your leadership will be challenged, but you must endure.

Never give up on your abilities.

Each year, the National Council of Alpha Lambda Delta inducts up to five chapters into the prestigious Order of the Torch. This award recognizes chapters that have excelled in programming, chapter visibility, outreach, and general chapter activity.

IUPUI Indianapolis, IN





"It is quite difficult to select only five advisors from among the many superb Alpha Lambda Delta chapter advisors. These five advisors had an exceptional year with their chapters!" said Dr. Earwood.

Since 2005, **Sue Oole** has served as one of the chapter advisors for Alpha Lambda Delta Honor Society at Western Michigan University. Since that time, the chapter has grown from 100 students to 333 members this year. The yield of eligible students joining the chapter this year was a remarkable 97.94%! This increase in membership is due in large part to the passion and enthusiasm, Sue Oole has invested in advising this honor society.

Not only did the Western Michigan chapter have a record number of students join, but the chapter was also quite active in both the local and campus communities. The chapter volunteered at the Oakwood Community Center and were featured in the national magazine, The FLAME. 

Spring cleaning led ALD members to spend an afternoon scrubbing, mopping


and polishing the historical St. Joseph's Chapel on our campus. Since we held our installation in the chapel the following week, we were especially proud of our work.







The National Council of Alpha Lambda Delta Honc Society was convened on Wednesday, June 20, 2007, i Minneapolis, Minnesota by National President, Dr. Jame Stemler of the University of Portland.

In attendance were Dr. Susan M. Huffman, Vice Presider for Chapter Relations and Expansion; Dr. Herman "Butch" Hi Vice President for Finance and Long Range Planning; Men bers-at-Large Brian Carlisle, Dr. Alice Lanning, Lisa Ruch, D. - Plans for the Society's 85th anniversary were discussed.






This year, six chapters received the Alpha Lambda Delta Lampadia Award for Oustanding Chapter Websites.
